Silver Falls Loop.

This 3-mile hike on the east side of Rainier is oh-so magical. Home to really, really big old growth trees and one incredible waterfall, you'll feel a bit like you're entering a magical kingdom on an island in the middle of the Ohanapecosh River. With ancient Douglas firs, western hemlocks and western red cedars—this is a special place that deserves respect and reverence. Trail of Shadows.

Short but sweet, this flat, easy hike is great for novice hikers, and is packed with points of interest. Mineral springs paint the meadows in a bouquet of colors, as you walk through towering red alder, western red cedar and lodge pole pine as you make your way to the Longmire Springs Hotel. Visit Crystal Mountain

Make your kids say “wow” with a ride up the Mt. Rainier Gondola at Crystal Mountain Resort. You can ride the gondola in summer or winter, and even dine at Washington’s highest restaurant, the Summit House, once at the top. It’s fun for everyone and perfect for families.

Flying Raven Adventure Course

Welcome to Crystal Mountain's first-ever aerial adventure course. It's the ultimate outdoor summer challenge. This high ropes course has something for everyone, from seasoned thrill-seekers to first-timers. Located next to the Quick Stop yurt in Discovery Meadow, you can climb up tall evergreen trees where ravens fly high and the creek babbles below.

For families with kids ages 6 and older, participants must be at least 6 years old, weigh at least 50 lbs, and be at least 42” tall. The course is a 3-hour tour, including time to gear up, go through our safety briefing, and navigate the course. Observers are welcome but must stay behind the fencing at all times. The nearby Quicksilver Yurt offers refreshments and a relaxing sundeck for those not on the course. crystallmountainresort.com/things-to-do/activities/flying-raven-adventure-course



Hike with a guide.

For older children that are experienced hikers capable of intermediate to advanced hikes, guided hikes are scheduled at Crystal Mountain throughout the summer. These hikes are a great way to learn from local experts while hiking on trails you may not have ventured on alone.

Fun and educational, this 18-mile train ride takes you back in time on a beautiful trip through the forest and foothills south of Mount Rainier, to a logging museum packed with history. The Railroad has themed rides throughout the year, so be sure to check the calendar for fun rides including The Polar Express and more!

Explore Northwest Trek Wildlife Park

Bison and wolves and bears, oh my. While a visit to Mt. Rainier may not always present you with an opportunity to see wildlife in their natural habitat, Northwest Trek Wildlife Park is a sure thing. This massive 725-acre wildlife park tucked away in the forest near Mt. Rainier is the best (and safest) way to see over 200 North American animals from 30 different species, including owls, beavers, bobcats, cougars, lynx, elk, bears and beyond. Whether you take a leisurely walk through the trails or hop on the popular 45-minute tram tour, this is an experience you and your kids will not soon forget.

Meet the boys Huckleberry and Hawthorne

If you haven't checked in on the park's grizzly bears, this dynamic fur-covered duo is growing up fast. It's best to see them in person, but you can get a preview here:

Ride the Rails

Rail Cycle Mt. Rainier

RailCycle Mt. Rainier offers a family-friendly, pedal-powered rail bike excursion. You can experience the Pacific Northwest's logging and railroading history while enjoying stunning views of lush pastures and forestland. RailCycles are easy to pedal and depart from Eatonville, on the road to Mt. Rainier National Park. You will travel 1.5 miles to a scenic turnaround spot for a 35-minute layover before returning.



Each RailCycle has 4 seats. You can book your own quad cycle for \$161.25, share your bike with a RailCycle guide for \$120.00, or share a cycle with another couple for \$86. There is no minimum age limit. Children under 25 lbs can ride with an adult in a front-style harness or carrier, as long as you can buckle their seatbelt. Children who can sit up on their own must have their own seat and use their seatbelt. Special 5-point harnesses are available for extra security. While not all children may reach the pedals, they can still enjoy the ride.

Children must sit in their own seat and cannot sit on an adult's lap during the ride.

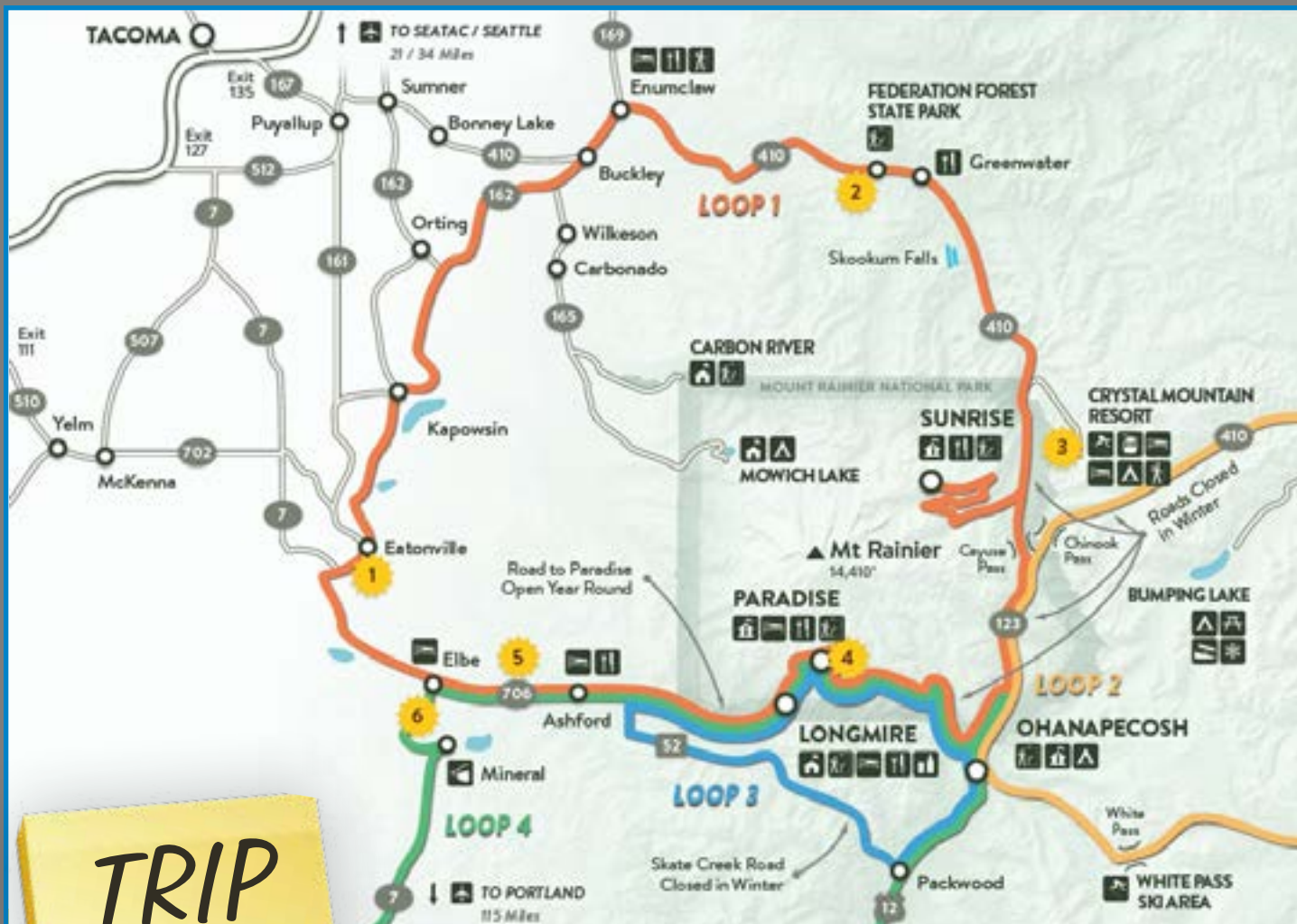
